- 1. A member entitled to attend, and vote is also entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote instead of himself and such proxy need not be a member of the Company. Proxies in order to be effective must be received by the Company at its registered office not less than 48 hours before the meeting. A person can act as a proxy on behalf of Members not exceeding fifty and holding in aggregate not more than ten percent of total share capital of the Company. A member holding more than ten percent of the total share capital of the Company carrying voting rights may appoint a single person as proxy and such person shall not act as proxy for any other person or member.
- 2. Proxies submitted on behalf of Limited Companies, Body Corporates, Societies etc. must be supported by appropriate resolution/authority, as applicable. Blank Proxy form is attached.
- 3. Route-map to the venue of the Meeting is provided at the end of the notice for the convenience of the members.
- 4. Corporate members are intending to send their Authorized Representatives to attend the Meeting are requested to send to the Company a certified copy of the Board resolution authorizing their representative to attend and vote on their behalf at the meeting.

11. Voting through electronic means

In compliance with provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, as amended from time to time and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, Members are provided with the facilities to cast their votes on all resolutions set forth in the Notice of the Annual General Meeting using electronic means and business may be transacted through remote e-voting. The Company has engaged the service of Central Depository Services (India) Ltd. (CDSL) as the authorized agency to provide the remote e-voting facilities.

The facility for voting through ballot paper shall be made available at the Annual General Meeting and the members attending the meeting who have not cast their vote by remote e-voting shall be able to exercise their right at the meeting through ballot paper.

The members who have cast their vote by remote e-voting prior to the Annual General Meeting may also attend the Annual General Meeting but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again.

The notice of the e-voting process along with printed Attendance Slip and Proxy Form is being dispatched to all the Members. The e-voting particulars are provided at the bottom of the Attendance Slip.

The Instructions for E-Voting are as under:

- (i) The remote e-voting period begins from 27-09-2021 from 9.00 A.M. and ends on 29-09-2021 till 5.00 P.M. During this period, shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off/entitlement date of 23-09-2021 may cast their vote electronically. The remote e-voting module shall be disabled by Central Depository Services (India) Ltd. for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

(iv) In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

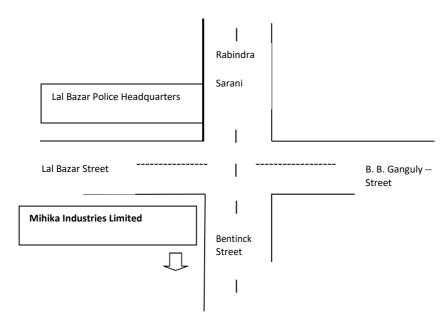

EXPLANATOTY STATEMENT [PURSUANT TO SECTION 102(1) OF THE COMPANIES ACT, 2013 (the Act)] Item No. 4

Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia was re-appointed as the Managing Director of the Company for a period of five years effective from 1st October 2016 till 30th September, 2021 and the said re-appointment was approved by the shareholders at the 33rd Annual General Meeting held on 29th September, 2016.

The Board of Directors of the Company at its meeting held on 3rd September, 2021 has, subject to the approval of the shareholders, re-appointed Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia as Managing Director of the Company for another term of 5 (five) years with effect from 1st October, 2021 on the terms and conditions including remuneration as recommended by the Nomination and Remuneration Committee of the Company and approved by the Board of Directors.

Brief particulars of Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia, as required under SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 are annexed to this Notice.

Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia, Mrs. Shweta Sethia and Mr. Manoj Sethia are interested in the resolution set out at item no. 3 of the Notice with regard to his re-appointment.

The terms and conditions of his appointment are as follows:

1. Tenure:

Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia will be appointed for a period from 1st October, 2021 to 30th September, 2026

2. Remuneration:

Rs. 7,20,000/- per annum (Rupees Seven Lacs Twenty Thousand Only) inclusive of all the perquisite and benefits. For the purpose of calculating the above ceiling, perquisite and allowances shall be evaluated as per Income Tax Rules, 1962 wherever applicable. In the absence of any such rules, perquisite and allowances shall be evaluated as per rules of the Company. The gratuity payment shall be considered as per Company's rules and shall not be included in the computation of ceiling on remuneration and perquisite.

3. Other terms of Appointment:

The terms set out for payment of remuneration specified herein may be altered and varied from time to time by the Board of Directors/Nomination and Remuneration Committee as it may, at its discretion deem fit. The Board is also entitled to revise the salary of Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia at any time, such that the overall yearly remuneration payable to the said Directors shall not exceed the limits specified under Schedule V of the Companies Act, 2013.

4. Minimum Remuneration:

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein contained, where in any financial year, the Company has suffered loss or its profits are inadequate, Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia shall be paid the above remuneration as minimum remuneration subject to the limit prescribed under section 197 read with Schedule V to the Companies Act, 2013.

Mr. Kuldeep Kumar Sethia will not be entitled to any sitting fee for attending meetings of the Board.

The Board of Directors, therefore, recommends the resolution for approval of the Member.

COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic which is a once in a lifetime occurrence has brought with it an unimaginable suffering to people and to almost all sections of the economy. The nationwide lockdowns to curtail the transmission of disease, had put the global economy in extreme stress of the level not seen since the Great Depression and would have a long-lasting economic impact. The dynamic and evolving nature of the pandemic with its resurgence (second wave) at the close of the year once again creates uncertainty, including economic impact. Hopefully, the outreach of vaccination drives across the country, additional efforts to set up medical infrastructure and obtain required medical supplies, in addition to continued adherence to COVID-19 specific protocols will help in overcoming this testing situation. Like the greater economy, the pandemic coupled with the lockdown and relief measures provided by RBI had a bearing on the performance of the Company. MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

The Management Discussion and Analysis Report has to be read in conjunction with the Company's financial statements, covering overall performance and outlook of its activities which read as follows-

TRADE STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENT

The jute industry has seen significant increase in investments in the recent past due to need for improved efficiencies and economies of scale in the face of increasing labour costs and competition from dumped exports from Bangladesh. Jute textiles are covered under the Essential Commodities Act, 1955 as it is predominantly used for packaging of food grains which are essential commodities. The Company has recovered significantly after the first wave of COVID-19 in 2020 and could recover the earlier losses due to lockdown. The second wave is now rising and to contain the second wave, Jute Industry has been allowed to operate only at 30% capacity by the government of West Bengal in terms of their order dated 7th May, 2021. The road ahead in this regard is uncertain.

Precisely, Jute Industry has lost the market share on production of jute bags for packaging of food grains. The Jute Industry can only hope to regain the market in future when operations become stable. Movement towards jute-based consumer goods aided by increasing environmental awareness and lifestyle changes is quite perceptible. The prices have skyrocketed to highest ever levels and shown a steep rise of 50% within one year. More disturbingly, there is a physical shortage of raw jute and there is not enough jute for the industry to operate at full capacity till new season jute arrives in July/August 2021. Production is likely to be affected till such time as new jute arrives. High raw jute prices have been passed on to consumers and in many applications the levels are not economical for end users.

However, having combatted such scenario during the first wave, we hope to be successful again. Your directors stand in solidarity with the nation in such challenging time. Your directors stand in solidarity with the nation in such challenging times.

OPPORTUNITIES

There is rising awareness about disposal issues leading to high total cost of using synthetic; here lies the opportunity to offer jute consumer products including jute bags as a mass consumption product. Acceptance of jute products are increasing due to its biodegradability as well as eco-friendly nature.

Jute's versatile applications have been already started for lifestyle and promotional bags, decorative, apparels, composites, upholstery furnishings, and also non-woven for both technical and non-technical purpose. Number of Research & Developments are going on in these fields. The industry would do well to take advantage of such various developments.

Usage of eco-friendly jute sacs for packaging food grains is in sync with the government adopted UN sustainability goals of alleviating poverty, zero hunger, responsible consumption/production and climate change.

Hence, continued compulsory jute packaging for food grains is likely to be an environmental necessity as well in times to come.

THREATS/RISKS AND CONCERNS

Following are the major areas of risks and concerns:

- (a) Conversion cost such as Wages, Power, Insurance etc. have been increased to a large extent resulting in higher cost of production.
- (b) COVID 19 is a major threat to the Jute Industry and a matter of concern as the operations could affect any time.
- (c) Seasonal shortages of labour due to adhocabsenteeism, change in new migrant labour availability patterns, shortage of skilled labour and union activism further add to high man power costs.
- (d) Attempt made for artificially lowering/capping the price being paid for sacking supplied by the industry for Packaging food grains to various government agencies is an area of concern.
- (e) Despite its eco-friendly nature and ability to with stand multiple use, jute industry is forced to plead its case each year for extension of JPM Act, 1987.
- (f) Unbridled increase in wage costs without linkage to productivity in the face of competition from Bangladeshi jute products produced with cheap de-unionised labour and dumped into India.
- (g) As an agricultural product, Jute is at the mercy of the vagaries of weather.

SEGMENT-WISE OR PRODUCT-WISE PERFORMANCE

The Company operates primarily in one business segment viz. trading of Raw Jute activities in India and accordingly this is the only Single Reportable Segment.

OUTLOOK

The raw jute crop in the previous season had been badly impacted because of the effect of Cyclone Amphan in month of May 2020 followed by continuous heavy rains. This resulted into crop shortage and all-time high prices of Raw Jute during the year. In the ensuing season because of good weather conditions the crop is expected to be good and availability of Raw Jute throughout the year will be normal at reasonable prices. Your management is sustaining its efforts to improve the efficiency and productivity resulting into better performance. With increased focus on increased farmer income and assurance of a remunerative Minimum Support Price, demand for packaging products will try to sustain in Covid Market.

It is seen that jute-based consumer products are gaining increasing acceptance. With the increasing aversion to plasticbags owing to pollution threats, increased usage of jute products can be expected.

The Company endeavors to be an important player in the field of Raw Jute trade and trying to combat the issues faced due to Covid 19 outbreak. There is good prospect of expanding business in this trade.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEM AND THEIR ADEQUACY

The Company has proper and adequate internal control systems to ensure that all assets are safeguarded and protected against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and all transactions are authorized, recorded and reported properly. The Internal Auditors are mandated to carry out periodical audit and report on areas of non-compliances/weaknesses. Corrective actions in case of reported deficiencies, if any, are taken actively to further strengthen the internal control systems. These reports are reviewed by the Audit Committee of the Board of Directors for follow-up action and instructions are issued for taking necessary measures. The Company has, in all material respects, an adequate internal financial controls system over financial reporting and such internal financial controls with reference to financial statements were operating effectively as at 31st March, 2021, based on the essential components of internal controls over financial reporting criteria established by the Company.

FINANCIAL AND OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE

The financial and operational performances are separately elaborated in the Directors' Report.

DEVELOPMENT IN HUMAN RESOURCES

Since development in human resource is needed for the organization's growth and to maintain its sustainability in the long run. The Company has continued its endeavor in maintaining peace and harmony at all levels of employment in the organization in the year under review. The Company is continuing its efforts through training to enhance competence of its manpower to make them more resourceful in their present job and also to prepare them for future roles. The Company has also introduced staff welfare schemes under which benefits are provided to deserving members of staff.

DETAILS OF SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN KEY FINANCIAL RATIOS

There has been no significant change (i.e., change of 25% or more as compared to the immediately previous financial year) in any key financial ratios viz. debtor's turnover, inventories turnover, current ratio, debt-equity ratio, and operating profit margin. Opinion

Note No. 1 - Corporate Information

Mihika Industries Limited (the Company), is a public limited Company domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act applicable in India. Its shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange in India. The registered office of the Company is located at 3, Bentinck Street, 2nd Floor, Kolkata – 700 001.

The Company is engaged in the business of trading in commodities.

Note No. 2 - Basis of Preparation

(i) Statement of Compliance

The financial statements comply in all material aspects with Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 'Ind AS') as under the companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 read with companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016 and other relevant provisions of the Act.

(ii) Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR), which is also the Company's functional currency. All amounts have been rounded off to the nearest rupees, unless otherwise indicated.

(iii) Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared following accrual basis of accounting on a historical cost basis, except for certain financial assets and liabilities which are measured at fair value.

(iv) Current non-current classification

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle (twelve months) and other criteria set out in Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013.

Note No. 3 - Significant Accounting Policies

(i) Use of Estimates & Judgements

The preparation of these Financial Statements requires management judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of Accounting Policies, the Accounting disclosures made and the reported amounts of Assets, Liabilities, Income and Expenses. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to Accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and any future periods effected pursuant to such revision.

(ii) Critical accounting judgements and key source of estimation uncertainty

The Company is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis.

Estimation of current tax expenses and payable (Refer note no. 26)

Estimation of uncertainties relating to the global health pandemic from COVID-19 (COVID-19):

In March 2020, the World Health Organisation declared COVID-19 a global pandemic. Consequent to this, Government of India declared a nation-wide lockdown from 24th March 2020. Subsequently, the nation-wide lockdown was lifted by the Government of India, but regional lockdowns continue to be implemented in areas with significant number of COVID-19 cases. Although, the Company witnessed significant improvement in its operations during the second half of the year, the Company remains watchful of the potential impact of COVID-19 pandemic, particularly the current "second wave", on resuming normal business operations on a continuing basis. Accordingly, the Company has assessed the impact of this pandemic on its business operations and has considered all relevant internal and external information available up to the date of approval of these financial statements, to determine the impact on the Company's revenue from operations and estimation of sales related expenses over the foreseeable future and the recoverability and carrying value of certain assets such as property, plant and equipment, investments, inventories, trade receivables, deferred tax assets and interest receivables. The impact of COVID-19 pandemic on the overall economic environment being uncertain may affect the underlying assumptions and estimates used to prepare Company's financial results, which may differ from impact considered as at the date of approval of these financials statements. The Company continues its business activities, in line with the guidelines issued by the Government authorities, take steps to strengthen its liquidity position and further explore cost restructuring exercise. The Company does not anticipate any challenges in its ability to continue as going concern or meeting its financial obligations. As the situation is unprecedented, the Company is closely monitoring the situation as it evolves in the future.

(iii) Property, plant and equipment (PPE)

Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated losses, if any. Cost includes expenses directly attributable to bringing the Asset to their location and conditions necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the management.

Subsequent cost are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that is future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation methods, estimated useful lives and residual value

Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method to allocate their cost less their residual values on the basis of useful lives prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.

The residual values are not more than 5% of the cost of an item of PPE. Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at the end of each financial year and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in profit or loss within other gains/(losses).

(iv) Financial Instruments

Financial assets - Initial recognition:

Financial assets are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. On initial recognition, a financial asset is recognised at fair value, in case of Financial assets which are recognised at fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL), its transaction cost are recognised in the statement of profit and loss. In other cases, the transaction cost are attributed to the acquisition value of the financial asset.

Subsequent measurement:

Financial assets are subsequently classified as measured at:

- amortised cost
- fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)
- fair value through profit & loss (FVTPL)

The above classification is being determined considering the:

- (a) the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and
- (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their recognition, except if and in the period the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

(a) Measured at amortised cost:

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost, if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified date to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

(b) Measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI):

Financial assets are measured at FVTOCI, if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows that give rise on specified dates to solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and by selling financial assets. Fair value movements are recognized in the other comprehensive income (OCI). Interest income measured using the EIR method and impairment losses, if any are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. On derecognition, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from the equity to 'other income' in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

(c) Measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL):

Financial assets other than equity instrument are measured at FVTPL unless it is measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI on initial recognition. Such financial assets are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value, including interest income and dividend income if any, recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Impairment

For financial assets other than trade receivables, the Company recognises 12—months expected credit losses for all originated or acquired financial assets if at the reporting date the credit risk of the financial asset has not increased significantly since its initial recognition. The expected credit losses are measured as lifetime expected credit losses if the credit risk on financial asset increases significantly since its initial recognition. If, in a subsequent period, credit quality of the instrument improves such that there is no longer significant increase in credit risks since initial recognition, then the Company reverts to recognizing impairment loss allowance based on 12 months ECL. The impairment losses and reversals are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss. For financial assets measured at FVTPL, there is no requirement of impairment testing.

Derecognition

The Company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers rights to receive cash flows from an asset, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement.

In that case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.

Financial Liabilities

Initial Recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. Financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value net of transaction costs for all financial liabilities not carried at fair value through profit or loss.

There are NIL financial liabilities during the period covered in these financial statements.

Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities measured at amortised cost are subsequently measured at using EIR method. Financial liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

De-recognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Balance Sheet if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

No financial assets and/or financial liabilities have been subject to offsetting.

Fair Value Measurement

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs. All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable
- Level 3 Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

(v) Inventory

Inventories are stated at lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on weighted average / first-in, first-out (FIFO) basis, as considered appropriate by the Company. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Provision is made for obsolete/slow moving/defective stocks, wherever necessary.

(vi) Taxes on Income

Taxes on income comprises of current taxes and deferred taxes.

Current Tax

Current tax in the Statement of Profit and Loss is provided as the amount of tax payable in respect of taxable income for the period using tax rates and tax laws enacted during the period, together with any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred Tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the corresponding amounts used for taxation purposes. Deferred tax asset is also recognised in respect of carried forward tax losses and unused tax credits.

Deferred Tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences, carried forward tax losses and unused tax credits.

Deferred Tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on the tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Minimum Alternate Tax credit is recognised as deferred tax asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period. Such asset is reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and the carrying amount of the MAT credit asset is written down to the extent there is no longer a convincing evidence to the effect that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period.

The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. In case of deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities, the same are offset if the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off corresponding current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the Company.

(vii) Revenue Recognition

The Company recognises revenue when it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Sale of Stock-in-trade

The Company derives revenues primarily from trading in commodities. Effective April 01, 2018, the Company has adopted Indian Accounting Standard 115 (Ind AS 115) -'Revenue from contracts with customers' using the cumulative catch-up transition method, applied to contracts that were not completed as on the transition date i.e. April 01, 2018. Accordingly, the comparative amounts of revenue and the corresponding contract assets/ liabilities have not been retrospectively adjusted. The effect on adoption of Ind-AS 115 was insignificant.

Revenue is recognized on satisfaction of performance obligation upon transfer of control of promised products or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those products or services.

Interest

Interest is recognized on time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend

Dividend on shares & securities is recognised on receipt basis.

(viii) Employee Benefits

Contribution of Provident Fund, Gratuity and Leave encashment benefits wherever applicable is being accounted on actual liability basis as and when arises. However, the above referred provisions are not applicable to the company as it does not fall within the purview of the same in the year under review.

(ix) Provision and Contingent Liabilities

Provisions are recognised when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and there is a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period. The discount rate used to determine the present value is a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

A disclosure for contingent liabilities is made when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation and the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure for contingent liability is made.

Contingent Assets are not recognised but are disclosed when an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

(x) Earnings Per Share

(a) Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing:

- the profit attributable to owners of the Company
- by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the financial year.

(b) Diluted earnings per share

Diluted earnings per share adjusts the figures used in the determination of basic earnings per share to take into account:

- the after income tax effect of interest and other financing costs associated with dilutive potential equity shares, and
- the weighted average number of additional equity shares that would have been outstanding assuming the conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares

Note No. 4 Applicability of new Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS'), amendments and interpretations:

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") through Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2020 has notified the following major amendments which became applicable with effect from April 1, 2020.

Amendments to Ind AS 103- Business combinations

The amendments clarify that while businesses usually have outputs, outputs are not required for an integrated set of activities and assets to qualify as a business. To be considered a business, an acquired set of activities and assets must include, at a minimum, an input and a substantive process that together significantly contribute to the ability to create outputs.

The amendments remove the assessment of whether market participants are capable of replacing any missing inputs or processes and continuing to produce outputs. The amendments also introduce additional guidance that helps to determine whether a substantive process has been acquired.

The amendments introduce an optional concentration test that permits a simplified assessment of whether an acquired set of activities and assets is not a business. Under the optional concentration test, the acquired set of activities and assets is not a business if substantially all of the fair value of the gross assets acquired is concentrated in a single identifiable asset or group of similar assets.

The adoption of these amendments has not had any impact on the disclosures or reported amounts in these financial statements.

Amendments to Ind AS 116 - Leases

The amendments provide practical relief, subject to certain conditions, to lessees in accounting for rent concessions occurring as a direct consequence of COVID-19, by introducing a practical expedient to Ind AS 116. The practical expedient permits a lessee to elect not to assess whether a COVID-19-related rent concession is a lease modification. A lessee that makes this election shall account for any change in lease payments resulting from the COVID-19-related rent concession the same way it would account for the change applying Ind AS 116 if the change were not a lease modification.

The adoption of this amendment has not had any impact on the disclosures or reported amounts in these financial statements.

Amendment to Ind AS 109 and Ind AS 107 - Interest Rate Benchmark Reform

These amendments modify specific hedge accounting requirements to allow hedge accounting to continue for affected hedges during the period of uncertainty before the hedged items or hedging instruments affected by the current interest rate benchmarks are amended as a result of the on-going interest rate benchmark reforms. The adoption of this amendment has not had any impact on the disclosures or reported amounts in these financial statements.

Amendment to Ind AS 1 and Ind AS 8 - Definition of "Material"

The Company has adopted the amendments to Ind AS 1 and Ind AS 8 for the first time in the current year. The amendments make the definition of material in Ind AS 1 easier to understand and are not intended to alter the underlying concept of materiality in Ind ASs. The concept of 'obscuring' material information with immaterial information has been included as part of the new definition."

The threshold for materiality influencing users has been changed from 'could influence' to 'could reasonably be expected to influence'. The definition of material in Ind AS 8 has been replaced by a reference to the definition of material in Ind AS 1. In addition, the MCA amended other Standards that contain the definition of 'material' or refer to the term 'material' to ensure consistency.

The adoption of these amendments did not have any material impact on its evaluation of materiality in relation to the financial statements.

New and revised Ind ASs, amendments and interpretations in issue but not yet effective:

At the date of approval of these financial statements, the Company has not applied the following amendments that have been issued but are not yet effective.

I Amendment to Ind AS:

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) vide Notification dated 18th June, 2021 has issued new Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Amendment Rules, 2021. These rules are applicable with immediate effect from the date of the said notification. Major amendments notified in the notification are provided below:

- (a) Ind AS 116 | Leases The amendment extends the benefits of the COVID 19 related rent concession that were introduced in the previous year (which allowed lessees to recognize COVID 19 related rent concessions as income rather than as lease modification) from 30th June, 2021 to 30th June, 2022.
- (b) Ind AS 109 | Financial Instruments The amendment provides a practical expedient for assessment of contractual cash flow test, which is one of the criteria for being eligible to measure a financial asset at amortized cost, for the changes in the financial assets that may arise as a result of Interest Rate Benchmark Reform. An additional temporary exception from applying hedge accounting is also added for Interest Rate Benchmark Reform.
- (c) Ind AS 101 | Presentation of Financial Statements The amendment substitutes the item (d) mentioned in paragraph B1 as 'Classification and measurement of financial instruments'. The term 'financial asset' has been replaced with 'financial instruments'.
- (d) Ind AS 102 | Share-Based Payment The amendments to this standard are made in reference to the Conceptual Framework of Financial Reporting under Ind AS in terms of defining the term 'Equity Instrument' which shall be applicable for the annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1st April, 2021.
- (e) Ind AS 103 | Business Combinations The amendment substitutes the definition of 'assets' and 'liabilities' in accordance with the definition given in the framework for the Preparation and Presentation of Financial Statements in accordance with Ind AS for qualifying the recognition criteria as per acquisition method.
- (f) Ind AS 104 | Insurance Contracts The amendment covers the insertion of certain paragraphs in the standard in order to maintain consistency with IFRS 4 and also incorporates the guidance on accounting treatment for amendments due to Interest Rate Benchmark Reform.
- (g) Ind AS 105 | Non-current assets held for sale and discontinued operations The amendment substitutes the definition of "fair value less costs to sell" with "fair value less costs of disposal".
- (h) Ind AS 106 | Exploration for and evaluation of mineral resources The amendment has been made in reference to the Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting under Indian Accounting Standards in respect of expenditures that shall not be recognized as exploration and evaluation assets.
- (i) Ind AS 107 | Financial Instruments: Recognition, Presentation and Disclosure The amendment clarifies the certain additional disclosures to be made on account of Interest Rate Benchmark Reform like the nature and extent of risks to which the entity is exposed arising from financial instruments subject to interest rate benchmark reform; the entity's progress in completing the transition to alternative benchmark rates, and how the entity is managing the transition.
- (j) Ind AS 111 | Joint Arrangements In order to maintain consistency with the amendments made in Ind AS 103, respective changes have been made in Ind AS 111.
- (k) Ind AS 114 | Regulatory Deferral Accounts The amendment clarifies that an entity may only change its accounting policies for the recognition, measurement, and impairment & derecognition of regulatory deferral account balances if the change makes the financial statements more relevant to the economic decision-making needs of users and no less reliable.
- (I) Ind AS 115 | Revenue from Contracts with Customers Certain amendments have been made in order to maintain consistency with number of paragraphs of IFRS 15.
- (m) Ind AS 8 | Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors In order to maintain consistency with the amendments made in Ind AS 114 and to substitute the word 'Framework' with the 'Conceptual Framework of Financial Reporting in Ind AS', respective changes have been made in the standard.

- (n) Ind AS 16 | Property, Plant and Equipment –The amendment has been made by substituting the words "Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and its value in use" with "Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use".
- (o) Ind AS 34 | Interim Financial Reporting —The amendments to this standard are made in reference to the conceptual framework of Financial Reporting in Ind AS.
- (p) Ind AS 37 | Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets The amendment substitutes the definition of the term 'Liability' as provided in the Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting under Indian Accounting Standards.
- (q) Ind AS 38 | Intangible Assets The amendment substitutes the definition of the term 'Asset' as provided in the Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting under Indian Accounting Standards.

The Company is evaluating the impact of these amendments.

II Amendment to Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013:

On 24th March, 2021, MCA through a notification, amended Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013, with effect from 1st April, 2021. Key amendments relevant for the Company are:

- (b) Disclosure of specified ratios along with explanation for items included in numerator and denominator and explanation for change in any ratio in excess of 25% compared to preceding year.

Note No. 29 - Financial Risk Factors

The Company's activities exposes it to Liquidity Risk and Credit risk. The Board of Directors reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks, which are summarised as below

(a) Liquidity Risk

The risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. Liquidity risk management implies maintenance sufficient cash including availability of funding through an adequate amount of committed credit facilities to meet the obligations as and when due.

The Company manages its liquidity risk by ensuring as far as possible that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet its short tem and long term liabilities as and when due. Anticipated future cash flows, undrawn committed credit facilities are expected to be sufficient to meet the liquidity requirements of the Company.

(b) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counter-party fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company is exposed to credit risks from its operating activities, primarily trade receivables, cash and cash equivalents and other financial instruments.

To manage the credit risk from trade receivables, the Company periodically assess financial reliability of customes, taking into account the financial condtion, current economic trends, and analysis of historical bad debts and ageing of accounts receivable. Individual risk limits are set accordingly. The Company considers the probablity of default upon initial recognition of asset and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk on an ongoing basis throught each reporting period.

Trade and other receivables

The Company considers the probability of default upon initial recognition of assets and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risks on an ongoing basis throughout each reporting period.

To assess whether there is a significant change increase in credit risk the Company compares the risks of default occurring on the assets as at the reporting date with the risk of default as at the date of initial recognition. It considers the reasonable and supportive forward looking information such as:

- (i) Actual or expected significant adverse changes in business.
- (ii) Actual or expected significant changes in the operating results of the counterparty.
- (iii) Financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant change to the counterparty's ability to meet its obligations
- (iv) Significant increase in credit risk on other financial instruments of same counterparty.

Note No. 30 - Capital Risk Management

(a) Capital Management

The Company's objectives when managing capital are to:

- (i) safeguard their ability to continue as a going concern, so that they can continue to provide returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders, and
- (ii) maintain an optimal capital structure to reduce the cost of capital
